



**Request for expressions of interest in the position of
National Liaison Officer, Anti-Poverty Week
(based in the Centres Precinct, UNSW Law Building)**

Anti-Poverty Week was established in 2001 and is held in mid-October each year. Its main aims are to strengthen public understanding of the causes and consequences of poverty and hardship, and to encourage research, discussion and action to address the key problems. The Week involves hundreds of activities organised by community groups across Australia. Most activities are organised at State and local levels but the national level provides information, promotional material, a substantial website and other support. The National Liaison Officer is responsible to the National Chair of Anti-Poverty Week. The National Liaison Officer's responsibilities include preparing and distributing information about poverty issues and proposed activities; encouraging participation in the Week and media coverage of issues relating to poverty and activities throughout the Week; maintaining the website, including the calendar of activities; liaising with State Chairs and community groups; organising meetings; and general administration.

The position of National Liaison Officer is available for an agreed period of at least 12 months, commencing no later than 15th of January. It will involve an agreed amount of work averaging about 15 hours per week. There is considerable flexibility for negotiation of the times of work to suit study or family commitments.

The position will be based at the Social Justice Project which is in the Centres Precinct, Level 1 of the Law Building, University of New South Wales, (Kensington Campus). Remuneration will be in the vicinity of \$35 per hour, depending on qualifications and experience.
